

Understanding Behavior from the Outside In

- Understanding Behavior from the Outside In is a dynamic and engaging interactive learning experience that can be adapted to any size group, from 24 to 200.
- This highly interactive session introduces early educators to a systematic method for examining challenging behavior in group environments and provides an introduction to the book Children with Challenging Behavior: Strategies for Reflective Thinking, which can be used as an ongoing resource.
- Linda weaves stories from real children and families as well as from her own
 personal life into the material to bring the concepts to life. By making use of

varying modes of presentation including handouts, small group discussions, visuals, power points, and videos, the session stays vibrant and fresh as important concepts are covered in-depth, including: contributing factors to challenging behavior; who challenges you and why; your own emotional reactions to behavior; why children engage in challenging behavior; reflective tools and techniques; and how to implement these practices successfully in the "real world."

- Materials include the book Children with Challenging Behavior: Strategies for Reflective Thinking, many sample tools, a bibliography, and a PowerPoint™ handout summarizing the ideas being presented.
- Understanding Behavior is best done as a full day (six hours of presentation). Shorter versions may be available for keynotes or part-day presentations.
- An expanded, two-day version is available for those interested in further exploring the development of behavior support plans.

Training of Trainers Workshop

- The Training of Trainers (ToT) workshop prepares individuals in the community to support implementation of the concepts and strategies from the book Children with Challenging Behavior: Strategies for Reflective Thinking by Brault & Brault.
- This training is designed for individuals who will either be working within
 the early care and education settings in ongoing professional development
 or who work as behavioral health consultants.
- This session goes in-depth about methods to support reflective practice and systematic examination of multiple internal and external factors that influence the behavior of both adults and children. Many unique ideas and expanded activities are taught.
